


Kindergarten Roundup

Electronic Nicotine Delivery Systems (e-cigarettes)

Being a parent is the most difficult job there is. As parents, we have to be a "jack of all trades." We worry about everything when it comes to our kids. We want the best for them and want them to make good choices. We hope they make good choices when we aren't around.

It's so much harder being a kid today than when we grew up. Our kids get bombarded from all directions—TV, social media, smart phones, bullying, drugs, alcohol, and peer pressure to

name a few. The latest trend among middle and high school aged kids is e-cigarettes.

E-cigarettes, electronic nicotine delivery systems, or hookah pens are delivery systems designed to mimic smoking a cigarette. They produce an odorless vapor that resembles smoke. I'm concerned that e-cigarettes may encourage young people to start smoking, particularly because of their novelty value and the common assumption that they are safe.

E-cigarettes differ from regular cigarettes in several ways. They often come in flavors marketed to young people such as strawberry, watermelon, cherry, or apple, have colorful packaging, and look like a "pen." They are sold individually at convenience stores, smoke shops and online.

E-cigarettes contain liquid nicotine and not tobacco. The issue surrounding liquid nicotine is that the FDA has not approved its use. The short- and long-term effects are not yet known. Also, e-cigarettes are not being regulated, so some of the brands have been found to contain more nicotine than advertised. Young people who start using e-cigarettes could easily and quickly become addicted to nicotine and progress to

smoking cigarettes as well as—or instead of—e-cigarettes.

The Liberty High School robotics program is in its sixth season competing in the FIRST Robotics Competition (FRC). "The Mechanics of Mayhem" competed at two different competitions during the month of March. Liberty had approximately 20 students work on the robot in some fashion during the build season, and seven qualified to attend the regional events.

The team competed at the Auburn Mt. View District competition on February 28, and on March 7 the team competed at the West Valley High School District event and finished 4th. The team was eliminated in the quarterfinal rounds of competition.

The event was held at Central Washington University in the Nicholson Pavilion Gym.
